Safer Internet Day: 70% of children want filters to protect them online

New research to mark Safer Internet Day 2018 has found that although nearly 7 out of 10 children aged 11-16 think parental controls are a good idea, 6 out of 10 parents don't set them.

The research conducted by online safety organisation Internet Matters, which is supported by BT, also found that a third of children think they should be aged 15 before they are able to go online without restrictions, while 24% think parental controls should only be taken away once they reach the age of 17.

Carolyn Bunting, CEO of Internet Matters, said parents can find technology overwhelming, which is why they might not apply parental controls. "Our new Set Up Safe guides are designed to show parents how to set parental controls, for a whole range of the most popular apps and devices, in a really clear and easy to follow way," she said.

"As ever, it's important parents remember this is just one of the tools in the online safety toolkit and parents need to ensure they are having regular, frank and open conversations with their children about their digital world to ensure they are staying safe online."

- Check to see if **anyone else is reporting** the same story.
